

Combination Mark Portrait


The portrait oriented Kami Kit mark is also best used for third party applications. It should be used when the application space is vertically oriented.

In order to maintain our brand's consistency across various media forms, the logo should never be colored in any other way than these specified variations.












The Kami Kit website is an essential part of the Kami Kit company. Its where parents and educators are introduced to our products, and it's the primary point of sale for our educational kits.



Without introduced kids to paper folding), Folds of Truth (teaching origami's rich history, Kami Kit would not exist today. basic principles of geometry), and Folds of Beauty (moreadvanced folds based on squares, hexagons, and octagons). 1880 Froebelian folds were introduced into Japanese schools. 1880s The word origami, deriving from the Japanese words ori and kami meaning folding and paper respectively, began to be used to describe recreational folding. 1888-1936 Spanish author and philosopher Miguel de Unamuno used origami as a metaphor for discussions of science, religion, philosophy, and life throughout his career. 1919 Origami began to be implemented as learning tools in Ruldolf Steiner's first Waldorf school in Stuttgart, Germany and in the Bauhaus school of design as a means of training students in commercial design. Revered Bauhaus teacher and artist Josef Albers was especially adept at creating dome-shaped structures from flat sheets of paper. 1937 Margaret Campbell's highly influential book Paper Toy Making was published with 82 different origami projects. 1955 Folklorist Gershon Legman arranged an exhibition in Amsterdam of the origami of the Japanese master Akira Yoshizawa, master folder whose work inspired subsequent generations of folders. 1958 Lillian Oppenheimer, American origami pioneer, founded the Origami Center of America in New York. She is credited for popularizing origami in the US. 2022 Kami Kit is born!




